## The Inaugural Uganda Diaspora Convention Set To Mobilize For Social Transformation.

Kampala - The Inaugural Ministry of Foreign Affairs Uganda Diaspora Convention commenced in Kampala at the prestigious Commonwealth Speke Resort in Munyonyo. Held from the 18th to the 19th of December 2024, the convention, themed "Mobilizing Uganda's Diaspora for Socio-Economic Transformation," attracted hundreds of Ugandan nationals residing abroad, government officials, business leaders, and development partners to explore strategies for collaboration and investment.

Her Excellency Vice President Jessica Alupo delivered a keynote address, emphasizing the government's dedication to harnessing the diaspora's potential for national development. Government representatives presented various incentives and streamlined processes to encourage diaspora investment in critical sectors like agriculture, tourism, manufacturing, and technology.

The first day featured dynamic panel discussions and knowledge-sharing sessions, providing valuable insights into Uganda's economic landscape, business environment, and opportunities for impactful diaspora engagement. Hon. Gen. Odongo Jeje Abubakhar, Minister of Foreign Affairs, highlighted the pivotal role of the diaspora in Uganda's development agenda, emphasizing the convention's significance in empowering them to contribute meaningfully to socio-economic transformation.

The Convention facilitated vibrant networking opportunities, fostering connections among diaspora participants, government officials, and potential investors. Day Two, the concluding segment, provided a platform for diaspora members to present their ideas and projects to government and private sector stakeholders. Resolutions outlining actionable steps to enhance collaboration between the government and the diaspora were adopted during the event. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs reaffirms its commitment to strengthening bonds with Ugandans abroad, recognizing their indispensable role in realizing Uganda's Vision 2040.

# Uganda, Kenya and South Sudan Hold 4th Tripartite Technical Boundary Committee Meeting.

Kampala - The 4th Tripartite Technical Boundary Committee (TTBC) meeting, comprising representatives from South Sudan, Kenya, and Uganda, was successfully held from the 17th to the 19th of December 2024 at the Golden Tulip Hotel in Kampala. The primary objective of the meeting was to review and advance the agreements reached during the tripartite meetings of December 2019, September 2021, and December 2021.

Additionally, the delegates aimed to revise work-plans and budgets for establishing the tri-junction and determine the commencement date for the re-affirmation of the Tri-junction Point among the three countries.

Ms. Jacqueline W. Banana led the Uganda Delegation, Ms. Juster Nkoroi led the Delegation of the Republic of Kenya, and Hon. Dr. David Nailo Mayo led the delegation of the Republic of South Sudan. The meeting was inaugurated by Mr. Bagiire Vincent Waiswa, the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, who emphasized the significance of concluding and implementing the modalities for the tri-junction boundary point. Mr. Bagiire expressed gratitude to the African Union Border Programme (AUBP), the German Corporation for International Cooperation (GIZ), and the East African Community (EAC) for their support in facilitating border activities through equipment provision, funding, and technical capacity building. He acknowledged their role in sensitizing border communities and leaders to garner support for border demarcation activities.

The meeting concluded with the signing of the Report of the Kenya-South Sudan-Uganda Tripartite Technical Boundary Committee Meeting on the establishment of the Tri-junction at the Golden Tulip Hotel in Kampala, marking a significant step towards enhancing regional cooperation and boundary delineation efforts.









#### and AU Uganda Launch Official **Preparations** January CAADP Summit

Kampala - Minister of Foreign Affairs Gen. Odongo Jeje Abubakhar, Minister of Agriculture, Animal Industries and Fisheries, Hon. Frank Tumwebaze and the AU Commissioner for Agriculture, Rural Development, Blue Economy, and Sustainable Environment (ARBE)of the African Union Commission, H.E. Josefa Leonel Correia Sacko, on December 19th 2024, launched official preparations for the the Extraordinary Summit of the African Union Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP) set for January 9-11, 2025, in Kampala.

This extraordinary Summit under the theme "Building Resilient Agri- Food Systems in Africa" will bring together leaders to discuss sustainable agriculture and endorse Africa's Agri-Food System 10-Year Strategy and Action Plan. The Summit is also expected to address key challenges in food security and agri-food systems.

Leaders are expected to discuss solutions to land management, sustainability, and food security and other pressing agricultural challenges. Participants will explore strategies for enhancing agricultural productivity and sustainability across the continent.

The CAADP Kampala Summit is an opportunity to strengthen Africa's collective approach to food sovereignty and sustainable land management. By endorsing the Agri-Food Systems 10-Year Strategy, Africa will take significant steps toward climate resilience and food security.

#### Uganda -Qatar Convention Forges Stronger Bonds in 2024

Doha- The inaugural Uganda-Qatar Diaspora Convention 2024, held at La Cigale Hotel in Doha, was a significant milestone in fostering ties between Uganda and its diaspora in Qatar. Ambassador Stephen Chebrot Chemoiko, Uganda's Head of Mission in Qatar, opened the hybrid event with remarks emphasizing its importance.

Mr. Vincent Waiswa Bagiire, Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, highlighted efforts to finalize a Diaspora Policy aimed at mobilizing the and investment diaspora for economic participation. Plans for a business hub to support entrepreneurs and businesses were also unveiled, fostering innovation and collaboration.

Uganda's agricultural exports to Qatar, including sweet potatoes, avocados (with a 35% market share), and Nile Perch, were spotlighted. The embassy is also working to boost Qatari tourism to Uganda. Current trade figures show Uganda exports \$9M worth of goods annually to Qatar, while importing \$12.5M from Qatar.

Day two included National ID registration for Ugandans in Qatar and discussions on business opportunities, passport renewals, small-scale investments, and government securities. The convention aimed to strengthen collaboration and drive economic growth for Uganda and its diaspora.

# Hon.Odongo Jeje Abubakhar Delivers Statement to the AU Peace and Security Council

Kampala - Minister of Foreign Affairs, Hon. Gen. Odongo Jeje Abubakhar, recently addressed a Virtual Ministerial Meeting of the Peace and Security Council of the African Union, focusing on Somalia and Post ATMIS Security arrangements. In his address, Gen Odongo congratulated Somalia for achieving a credible Government and Leadership through three successive elections, noting their imminent joining of the UN Security Council. He commended all Troop and Police Contributing Countries and partners for their support to Somalia, AMISOM/ATMIS over the years.

Expressing concern over the recent situation in Ras Kamboni, Gen Odongo called for de-escalation of tensions and urged dialogue between the FGS and Juba-land to resolve any differences. He also welcomed the outcomes of the meeting of CDFs of Troop Contributing Countries in Mogadishu, emphasizing Uganda's readiness to support Somalia in the spirit of brotherhood, Pan Africanism, and solidarity.

Highlighting concerns about the funding model of ATMIS, Gen Odongo stressed Uganda's strong support for the full implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 2719 to finance the AU Support and Stabilization Mission in Somalia from 01 January 2025 onwards. He urged the Commission and the UN to develop a roadmap for resource mobilization to address the funding gap of 25% for AUSSOM as directed by resolution 2719, possibly through a pledging conference.

Furthermore, Gen Odongo called for the presentation of the AUSSOM Budget for review to determine the allocation from the Peace Fund in line with the decision of the 1236th meeting of the PSC. He emphasized the importance of mobilizing the required funding to address the ATMIS deficit of 120 million USD by 31 December 2024, urging collective efforts from the Commission, the UN, and International Partners to ensure the mission's operational continuity.

# Uganda High Commission in Kuala Lumpur, Strengthens Ties With ASEAN Through Tourism And Investment

Kampala - In a bid to advance its position as a top-tier destination for investment and tourism, The Uganda High Commission in Kuala Lumpur in collaboration with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs recently welcomed a delegation from the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) on a 10-day visit, held from November 25 to December 7, 2024 aimed strategically at leveraging its diplomatic networks to foster global partnerships.

H.E. Dr. Betty Oyella Bigombe, High Commissioner of Uganda to Malaysia, emphasized as part of Uganda's Economic and Commercial Diplomacy framework, this initiative aims to showcase the country's trade and tourism potential, marking a significant step toward enhanced economic collaboration between Uganda and ASEAN nations.

Dr. Bigombe said, "This event offers a unique opportunity for key players within the tourism sector and beyond to identify areas for strategic partnerships. Building robust collaborations with ASEAN not only enhances trade but also creates jobs and contributes to the economic development of both nations," she noted.

Amb. Betty further highlighted Uganda's attractive investment climate, including tax incentives and opportunities in key sectors like infrastructure, mineral value addition, agro-processing, and oil and gas, was underscored during the visit. Dr. Bigombe emphasized Uganda's access to regional markets through platforms like the East African Community (EAC), Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA), and the Africa Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA).

With the tourism sector as a cornerstone of Uganda's economy, contributing 7.7% to its GDP and creating nearly 667,000 jobs, according to a baseline report by Tourism Research and Development and ministry of Tourism, Wildlife and Antiquities, 2024. Dorcus Namajja of the Uganda Tourism Board, also underlined that the visit comes at a time when the Ugandan Government has made a deliberate effort to capitalize on its foreign missions to promote Uganda as a first-choice tourism destination intended to cultivate a long-term relationship between Uganda and ASEAN.

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Uganda's High Commission aims to sustain momentum with promotional media campaigns in Malaysia and business conventions in 2025 to boost partnerships in trade, technology, tourism, and agro-processing.

The visit concluded with a dinner attended by dignitaries, including Minister of State for Tourism Hon. Martin Mugarra Bahinduka, PS/Ministry of Foreign Affairs Mr. Bagiire Vincent Waiswa, and UTB CEO Lilly Ajarova. Amb. Bigombe emphasized the initiative's goal to reshape Asia's perception of Uganda and Africa, highlighting Indonesia's economic growth as an example.

Hon. Bahinduka praised the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Missions for effectively managing resources and acknowledged the Malaysia Mission's financial support for activities in Kampala and the FAM trip. He pledged to advocate for more resources, commending the Ministry's impactful work with limited funding.

This visit marked a pivotal step in strengthening Uganda's economic and tourism ties with Southeast Asia, positioning the country as a growing player in global trade.





### Uganda And Cuba Celebrate 50 Years of Diplomatic Relations.

Kampala - Uganda's Minister of Foreign Affairs, Hon. Gen. Odongo Jeje Abubakhar, with H.E. Tania Perez Xiques the Ambassador of the Republic of Cuba convened to discuss bilateral and international issues of mutual interest.

The Minister commended Cuba for its longstanding support, particularly the establishment of the Mbarara University of Science and Technology, a milestone in their partnership. He also outlined Uganda's priorities as Chair of the Non-Aligned Movement and G-77+China, emphasizing the need to champion the Global South's interests in security, conflict management, and economic development.



Both leaders condemned unilateral sanctions by certain countries, stressing that such measures undermine multilateralism and obstruct progress towards the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Marking 50 years of Uganda-Cuba diplomatic ties, Ambassador Xiques praised the relationship as exemplary, expressing confidence that the recently inked Memorandum of Understanding would boost trade and economic collaboration. Minister of State for International Affairs Hon. Okello Henry Oryem joined Cuban Ambassador H.E. Tania Perez Xiques in celebrating the milestone. During the event, she announced the conclusion of her official tour of duty in Uganda. MoFA congratulated her on a successful tenure.

## Uganda-Algeria Relations Deepen with Promising Trade and Educational Ties



Kampala - President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni held talks with Algerian Foreign Minister Ahmed Attaf, a special envoy of President Abdelmadjid Tebboune, to review progress on agreements made during Museveni's March 2023 state visit to Algeria.

The discussions highlighted increased trade, including a rise in Ugandan coffee exports from \$13M to \$16M and milk exports from \$800M to \$1B, with more Ugandan companies poised to access the Algerian market.

President Museveni was pleased to learn that the number of scholarships offered by Algeria to Ugandan students in science-based courses has surged from 100 to 217, demonstrating a deepening educational partnership between the two nations.

Expressing gratitude for the positive developments, President Museveni conveyed his support for Algeria's bid for the Vice Chairperson position of the African Union Commission. In return, he shared that Uganda is backing Kenya's Raila Odinga for the Chairmanship position, highlighting solidarity with East Africa and admiration for Odinga's Pan-Africanist stance. Minister Attaf delivered a written message from President Tebboune to President Museveni, affirming Algeria's commitment to enhancing bilateral relations and expanding collaborative efforts. The discussions between President Museveni and Minister Attaf also delved into various African Union agenda items, as well as regional and international developments, including the situation in the occupied Palestinian territories and the decolonization process in Western Sahara.



# Uganda and Dubai Chambers of Commerce Strengthen Economic Ties

The "Doing Business with Uganda" forum, held at the Sheraton Hotel in Kampala as part of the Uganda-Tanzania Roadshow, highlighted opportunities for trade, investment, and cooperation between Uganda and Dubai Chambers of Commerce. The event attracted business leaders and policymakers eager to explore collaborations across various sectors.H.E. Mohammed Ali Rashed Lootah, CEO of Dubai Chambers, praised Uganda's economic growth and strong trade ties with Dubai, noting that non-oil bilateral trade reached USD 1.2 billion last year.

He highlighted coffee as a key growth area, introducing the Dubai MCC Coffee Center to connect Ugandan exporters with global buyers. Lootah also encouraged Ugandan businesses to use Dubai as a gateway for global expansion and called on Dubai investors to explore Uganda's growing sectors, including energy and agriculture.

Ms. Olive Kigongo, President of the Uganda Chamber of Commerce and Industry, emphasized enhancing economic relations, citing Uganda's USD 1.12 billion exports to the UAE, mainly in gold and agricultural products. She highlighted Uganda's strategic position as a "land-linked" nation with access to 300 million consumers through trade agreements like EAC and COMESA.

President Olive Kigongo highlighted the country's economic relations with the UAE, highlighting its \$1.12 billion exports in gold and agricultural products. "H.E. Hassan Al Hashemi, VP of International Relations at Dubai Chambers, highlighted Dubai's role as a global hub, connecting the Middle East, Asia, and Africa, and attracting USD 10.7 billion in FDI in 2023. He emphasized Dubai's favorable tax policies and its appeal to foreign investors.

Mr. Martin Muhangi, Deputy Director General of the Uganda Investment Authority (UIA), described Uganda as a top investment destination with a young population, strategic trade agreements, and incentives like 10-year tax holidays for agroprocessors.

The forum concluded on a high note with the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Uganda Chamber of Commerce and Industry and Dubai Chambers. The MOU, signed by H.E. Olive Kigongo and H.E. Mohammed Ali Rashed Lootah, marks a significant step toward formalizing the commitment to enhance bilateral trade and investment cooperation between Uganda and Dubai.

As both regions look ahead, the "Doing Business with Uganda" forum serves as a beacon of prospective economic growth, inviting collaborative ventures that promise to benefit both Uganda and Dubai in their quest for sustainable development.

# Cross-Border Traders Push for Elimination of Fees and Charges to Optimize EAC Trade at Busia Border.

During the East African Business Council (EABC) - AGRA Public-Private Dialogue on Non-Tariff Barriers (NTBs) at the Busia One-Stop Border Post on December 5, 2024, women and youth cross-border traders called upon the Governments of EAC Partner States to eliminate fees and charges imposed by agencies to improve the uptake of the EAC Simplified Trade Regime (STR).

Mr. Frank Dafa, EABC Manager for Trade in Goods, representing the EABC Acting Executive Director, Mr. Adrian Njau, stated that the EAC STR has enabled cross-border traders to access the Simplified Certificate of Origin, exempting consignments valued under USD 2,000 from import duties. The high fees and charges undermined the purpose of the STR. The Public-Private Dialogue brought together 80 stakeholders, composed of 60 women and youth cross-border traders, trade facilitation agencies at the border, and officials from the Uganda Ministry of EAC Affairs and the Kenya Ministry of East African Community, Arid and Semi-Arid Lands (ASALs), and Regional Development.

Mr. Matia Etedu from the Uganda Ministry of EAC Affairs emphasized that agriculture, primarily conducted by women and youth, is the backbone of the economy and accounts for the highest intra-EAC trade.

Mr. Dennis Osoro, from the Kenya Ministry of EAC Affairs, noted that the region has established an EAC NTB reporting and elimination mechanism and encouraged traders to visit trade facilitation agencies at the border for advice on standards and quality requirements for their export/import consignments.

Following the successful dialogue, capacity building for women and youth cross-border traders on trade facilitation under the EAC STR was conducted. This initiative was part of the EABC-AGRA project, "Promoting Intra-EAC Agri-Food Cross-Border Trade by Addressing NTBs." The dialogue concluded with a commitment by Trade Facilitation Agencies to address challenges during Joint Border Management Committee meetings and streamline procedures to promote cross-border trade. EABC remains steadfast in presenting key policy recommendations from the dialogue to EAC Technical Committees for necessary policy reforms.

### SERA Wild Coffee, Crafting Excellence From Ugandan Arabica Beans To The Final Cup.

At Sera Wild Coffee, our Ugandan Arabica coffee undergoes a meticulous journey to ensure premium quality. The process begins in our farm in Kapkwata village, Chema sub county in Kapchorwa district on the slopes of Mount Elgon, where Arabica coffee thrives in the fertile volcanic soils and favorable climate. First, our casual workers carefully handpick ripe, red coffee cherries, ensuring only the best are selected.

Once harvested, the cherries are washed to remove impurities and sorted for uniformity. The washing process involves depulping the cherries to separate the beans from the fruit, followed by fermentation. This step enhances the beans' flavor profile by breaking down the mucilage layer. After fermentation, the beans are thoroughly washed again and spread out to dry under the sun. They are frequently turned to achieve consistent drying, which typically takes 7-14 days. The dried beans, now referred to as parchment coffee, are stored in moisture-controlled environments to preserve quality.

Next, the dry parchment coffee is hulled to remove the protective parchment layer, revealing the green coffee beans. These beans are graded and sorted based on size, density, and appearance to meet international standards. The highest-grade beans are then bagged and transported to the roaster facility.

At the roastery, the green coffee beans are expertly roasted to develop their rich flavors and aroma. This critical step involves precise temperature control to highlight the beans' unique notes, which include hints of chocolate, citrus, and floral undertones. After roasting, the beans are cooled, ground (if needed, and packaged in our eco-friendly bio-degradable cans to maintain freshness.

The final product is Sera Wild Coffee, a testament to the dedication of Ugandan farmers and our commitment to quality. Every cup offers a taste of Uganda's vibrant coffee heritage, crafted with passion from bean to brew.

We have 4 different roasts- Light, Medium, Gold and Dark Roast which come in 3 sizes that is 150gms, 250gms and 500gms at Ug shs 15000, 25000 and 50000 respectively.

### UNEB Plans To Establish Examination Center in Burundi to Ease Student Testing

**Bujumbura** - Top executives from the Uganda Naional Examinations Board (UNEB) led by the Chief Executive Mr. Dan Nokrach Odongo convened at the Uganda Embassy, Bujumbura to strategize an ideal approach to conclude the process of setting up a UNEB Examination Center in the Republic of Burundi.

The outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 disrupted the initial progress, as only one school in Burundi was teaching the Ugandan syllabus at the time. However, with the number of schools offering the Ugandan curriculum now standing at five and over 100 students per school annually traveling to Uganda for their final UNEB exams, the need for a local examination center has become imperative to alleviate the financial and logistical burdens on parents and students.

During the Joint Permanent Commission held in Bujumbura in March 2022, the collaboration areas agreed upon were in Education, Immigration and Health. The setting up of a UNEB Center in Burundi aligns with UNEB's Vision of becoming a globally competitive educational assessment and certification body.



UNEB top executives led by the Chief Executive Mr. Dan Nokrach Odongo (2nd L) held a meeting with Mr. Nangosya Mike Masikye, Director Examinations (2nd R) Mr. James Turyatemba Principal Examinations Officer (3rdR).

The meeting underscored that while H.E. President Yoweri Museveni has been a key advocate of regional integration, Uganda's education system has been a major player in that aspect with many alumni from the region studying at Ugandan institutions at secondary and tertiary levels. UNEB's role in enhancing Uganda's soft power diplomacy was also acknowledged.

In this sitting, UNEB committed to expedite internal processes and thereafter send a Technical Officer to Burundi in February 2025 during the Uganda Education Expo in Bujumbura. The Officer will also assess progress made in meeting criteria and adherence to UNEB guidelines shared in 2018.

The meeting was attended by Mr. Nangosya Mike Masikye, Director Examinations, Ms. Naigaga M. Laetitia representing the Office of the Executive Director, Ms. Nabukenya Rose Mukasa, Principal Examinations Officer, Mr. James Turyatemba and Mr. Solomon Kasasira from Uganda Embassy, Bujumbura.

# Hon. Nobert Mao Signs WIPO Treaty on Intellectual Property, Genetic Resources, and Traditional Knowledge.

Geneva - On December 4, 2024, Hon. Nobert Mao, Uganda's Minister of Justice and Constitutional Affairs, made a historic move by signing the WIPO Treaty on Intellectual Property, Genetic Resources, and Associated Traditional Knowledge at the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) headquarters in Geneva. The treaty aims to establish a global framework to protect and promote the intellectual property rights of nations, particularly concerning their genetic resources and traditional knowledge. This landmark agreement seeks to ensure fair and equitable sharing of benefits derived from the use of these valuable assets.

In his remarks, Minister Mao highlighted Uganda's commitment to protecting its cultural heritage and natural resources, emphasizing that the treaty will strengthen the country's capacity to protect its indigenous knowledge and support sustainable development. He remarked, "This treaty is a significant step towards safeguarding our cultural and natural assets and ensuring that local communities are fairly compensated for the use of their traditional knowledge and resources." The Director-General of WIPO Daren Tang expressed his strong support for Uganda's efforts, pledging to assist the country in building its intellectual property (IP) capacity.

He noted that WIPO is committed to supporting Uganda in strengthening its IP systems to ensure that the benefits of this treaty are fully realized. Mr. Tang further highlighted the importance of the treaty in enabling developing countries like Uganda to protect their valuable resources and traditional knowledge while fostering innovation and sustainable development. The signing of the WIPO Treaty and the pledge from the Director-General to assist Uganda in building IP capacity signals a strong partnership between WIPO and Uganda, setting the stage for enhanced international cooperation and development in intellectual property. This milestone underscores Uganda's leadership in the global dialogue on the protection of genetic resources, traditional knowledge, and cultural heritage. The Minister's engagement with the diaspora reflects Uganda's growing influence in the global arena, as well as its ongoing efforts to strengthen its economy, promote sustainable development.

In addition to the signing, Minister Mao also took time to meet with members of the Ugandan diaspora living in Switzerland, a meeting organized by the Uganda Permanent Mission. During the meeting, he commended them for their contribution to national development and encouraged them to invest in Uganda's growing economy and to continue working closely with the Ugandan Mission. "Your expertise and resources are vital in driving Uganda's progress. We welcome you to invest back home and support initiatives that will improve livelihoods, foster innovation, and protect our heritage," he said.

The Minister was accompanied by the Permanent Representative to the UN in Geneva Ambassador Marcel Tibaleka, the Registrar General of the Uganda Registration Services Bureau (URSB) – Ms. Mercy Kainobwisho, Mr. Gilbert Agaba, Director, Intellectual Property, URSB and staff of the Permanent Mission. Also in attendance was the Assistant Director General, Mr. Edward Kwakwa and Mr. Wend, Wendland, the WIPO Director for Traditional Knowledge.

The event was attended by members of several key organizations, including the British-Ugandan Doctors Association, the Uganda Nurses and Midwives Association UK CIC, the Ugandan Diaspora Allied Health Association UK, as well as representatives from the National Health Service (NHS) Health Partnerships with an interest in engaging the Ugandan diaspora in global health initiatives.

During the event, High Commissioner Madhvani emphasized both the opportunities and challenges within Uganda's health sector, urging the health diaspora community to unite in their patriotic efforts to enhance health outcomes for Ugandans.

The Health Associations present at the meeting agreed to collaborate more effectively in their respective global health programs. The High Commissioner also recognized three outstanding diaspora members-Primrose Magala, Moses Mulimira, and Dr. Nik Kotechafor their sustained dedication to strengthening the health sector in Uganda. Dr. Edith Nakku from the Uganda Medical Association emphasized the need for better alignment with the Ugandan government's health initiatives.

The Uganda-UK Health Alliance, a collaboration between the Ministry of Health in Uganda and NHS Health Education England, was highlighted as an umbrella organization for UK institutions and organizations involved in healthcare capacity-building activities in Uganda. This alliance serves as a platform for fostering partnerships and sharing expertise to bolster Uganda's healthcare system.



### Uganda Participates In Russian Healthcare Week 2024.

Moscow - The 5-day Russian Healthcare Week 2024 at Moscow's Expo Centre brought together global health stakeholders to showcase advancements in healthcare. Uganda used the platform to enhance bilateral ties with Russia, focusing on infectious diseases, emergency medical services, electronic medical records, and specialist training.

Representing Uganda's Health Minister, Dr. Joseph Okware, Director of Governance and Regulation, thanked Russia for its partnership, highlighting the recent donation of a mobile laboratory truck aiding outbreak response. Building on April's Africa-Russian International Scientific Conference in Kampala, Dr. Okware reiterated Uganda's collaboration priorities, particularly in emergency system management and transitioning from paper-based to electronic medical records.

Dr. Okware emphasized Uganda's need to develop affordable, specialized care locally, reducing reliance on costly treatment abroad. He noted the establishment of specialized hospitals such as UCI, UHI, and MSWNH to address this gap.

Accompanying him was Dr. Juliet Birungi, a consultant gynecologist-oncologist from Mulago Specialized Women and Neonatal Hospital, which focuses on advanced care for women and children.

Prof. Murashko, chairing the meeting, urged countries to identify specific collaborative interests with Russia's Health Ministry. He acknowledged Uganda's partnership in epidemic management, particularly Ebola, and highlighted Russia's leadership as the first to manufacture Ebola vaccines. This engagement underscores Uganda's commitment to leveraging international expertise to strengthen its healthcare system.

## Turning Plastic Waste into Prosperity, Uganda's Floating Island Leads Climate Innovation

As the world intensifies efforts to combat climate change, innovative solutions are emerging from unexpected places. In Luzira, Uganda, James Kateeba has massed recognition groundbreaking environmental project, the Floating Island. This initiative, built on Lake Victoria, transforms plastic waste into a sustainable asset while addressing pollution and empowering communities. The idea for the Floating Island emerged seven years ago when James observed the alarming pollution of Lake Victoria, primarily from empty plastic bottles originating from Munyonyo and Kampala. Inspired by a 1950s dry bamboo floating structure from Lake Kyoga, James adapted the concept using the readily available plastic waste instead of bamboo.

Built on 13 tons of recycled plastic bottles, it has evolved into a thriving ecosystem that seamlessly blends environmental conservation with economic empowerment. The impact of this initiative extends far beyond its structure, particularly benefiting the surrounding communities. One of the most striking successes of the Floating Island is the exceptional cleanliness of the waters surrounding it. Unlike other parts of Lake Victoria, which suffer from rampant plastic pollution, the waters near the Island are pristine. This transformation is attributed to a unique system introduced by James, where local fishermen and residents earn an income by collecting and selling plastic bottles. "This initiative turns pollution into opportunity," James explains. "People on the lake actively collect these bottles to sell to us, which not only cleans the lake but also creates jobs." By fostering a sense of shared responsibility for environmental preservation, the Floating Island has become a vital source of livelihood and a beacon of hope for the region.

The Floating Island is not just a concept; it is a tangible structure capable of hosting gatherings of 200-300 people at a time. With lush green vegetation adorning its surface, this artificial island serves as a mobile oasis of natural beauty. Anchored securely, the Island can traverse up to 100 meters into the lake, with waves acting as natural forces for movement. James envisions replicating the initiative across Uganda to bring similar environmental and economic benefits to other communities. "With the right support, this model can be scaled nationwide, offering solutions for housing, farming, and even disaster resilience," he noted. The Floating island demonstrates how grassroots innovation, coupled with strategic partnerships, can address global challenges such as climate change and inclusive development.

The Floating Island resonates deeply discussions from COP29 in Baku, Azerbaijan, which emphasized the urgency of innovative solutions to mitigate climate challenges. It offers a scalable model for countries in the Great Lakes region to combat pollution, promote sustainable agriculture, and adapt to rising water levels. Beyond its ecological benefits, the Floating Island exemplifies development and community engagement. By transforming waste into wealth, pollution into opportunity, and challenges into solutions, James Kateeba has conservation in Uganda. His visionary work is a reminder that tackling global environmental crises begins with bold local actions. As Uganda advances its climate action agenda, the Floating Island stands as a testament to the power of grassroots innovation, strategic partnerships, and unwavering determination to protect our planet.

His ambition and resilience inspire young Africans to leverage education and technology for transformative change, fostering progress and hope across the continent.

#### Ugandan Diaspora Hero Brings Accessible Healthcare to Namutumba.

Meet Job Hasigaye Zilaba Amooti, a trained social worker and Radiologist at the Bern University Hospital Clinic for Intensive Care Medicine, in Switzerland for several years. Zilaba whose ancestry is in Bunyoro, was born and raised in Mbale, but spent most of his life in eastern Uganda, where his father, a District Education Officer worked for many years.

Sharing his experience at the MOFA Inaugural Uganda Diaspora Convention, Zilaba said that his inspiration to found a hospital arose when he witnessed a roadside birth in Namutumba when an expectant mother had to give birth on the side of the road because the 72km journey to the nearest hospital in Iganga was too long. Thus the idea of the Namutumba Community Hospital was born. "The original goal was to provide immediate and appropriate care for women giving birth and their children in the Namutumba region," he shared.

Mobilizing assistance from residents in the area and a network of friends as well as his employer, the Klinik for Intensive Medicine Bern, in Switzerland, he got to work, identifying land and getting involved in construction in 2010. "The residents were involved in the project from the beginning," he said.

"The most difficult thing was the financial cost," he said. "I was encouraged by the people of Namutumba contributing what they could to the construction," he narrates. We handled the less expensive work, friends and family in Switzerland occasionally contributed, and I had incredible support of Klinik for Intensive Medicine Bern, which helped to get the Hospital ready L-R: Job Zilaba co-founder of the Namutumba Community for use with donations of equipment as well as helping Hospital, nurses monitoring iNICU incubator to fix the laboratory and lighting system".



On July 12, 2021, after 11 years of hard work and sacrifice, the Namutumba Community Hospital opened in Uganda, not just providing medical care but creating jobs. Zilaba also acquired a pre-used Ambulance that cost 12,000 CHF and the shipping costs to Namutumba Uganda was 4400 CHF, totalling to CHF 16,400. With his supporters, he deposited 5000 CHF and raised 9000 CHF through crowd funding covering the 2400 CHF from out of pocket.

The Namutumba Community Hospital is open to all people in the region who need medical support. The bed capacity is 50 beds. Of these, 15 are pediatric, 15 are gynaecological, and 20 are general patients. The hospital provides diagnostics, treatment, medication and pharmaceutical services under one roof. Patients come from the districts of Namutumba, Pallisa, Butalejja, Budaka and Bugiri. Post and ante-natal care is free, vaccination is free and the rest of the treatments are highly subsidized. Besides supporting the project, his co-workers in Bern not only also visited the site and volunteered in physical construction alongside him, but they regularly volunteer medical services at the hospital.

The staff work five days a week in 12-hour shifts. The day shift begins at 7:00 a.m. with the report. The rounds begin at around 7:15 a.m. They usually last around two hours, depending on the condition of the patients in the departments. The doctors then split up into teams. He further emphasizes that besides medical equipment, the Swiss culture of respect of patient rights, compassion and courtesy is one of the major adoptions of the hospital's methods of work.








### Genealogy: From Oral Tales to Written Legacy, Preserving and Honoring Uganda's Lineage Traditions

I was a Ugandan citizen upon birth until I left for the United States aged 21. When I acquired U.S. citizenship, I automatically lost my Ugandan citizenship because Uganda did not recognize dual citizenship at the time. People I suspect were not even born in Uganda hold positions of power there. I am told that for the privilege of asserting my birth right as a descendant of at least six generations of Ugandans of whom I know to have lived in Buddu and Kkooki, I must pay Uganda's government several hundred dollars just to apply to be considered for dual citizenship and then go through the rigorous process of getting a passport from Internal Affairs. Ironic,

I was tempted to ask the gentleman to list those six generations—not out of skepticism, but because I'm a genealogy enthusiast. As the Gen Zs might say, I'm a genealogy nerd. Among my people, the Bahororo, we'd say, "Ninkunda kuronda obuzare!" Genealogy, from the Greek word genealogía, meaning "the making of a pedigree," is the study of family history and the tracing of ancestral lineages. It's as old as the Bible, and its threads are woven into Uganda's traditions. Rituals like Okulanya/Okutambula nga Omuganda among the Baganda affirm belonging within lineages, clans and communities. Yet without systematic preservation, these practices risk fading away. My love for genealogy began in childhood, fueled by the vivid stories my grandparents shared. I wanted to know everything: my grandparents' parents, their parents, and so on. I wrote down names, sketched family trees, and imagined the lives behind them. Even now, when introduced to a relative, I insist on knowing the precise details of how we're connected. Being told they're my aunt, uncle, or cousin isn't enough. While some find it endearing, others may see it as excessive curiosity. I suppose I was an old soul, as my elders often remarked.

One school holiday from Kibuli Secondary School, I found my paternal grandmother, Justine Batendeza, in Kampala for treatment. I seized the opportunity to ask about her life and our family history. She answered most of my questions, indulging my curiosity. But when I asked for her mother's name, she smiled and gently said, "As a man, focus on your paternal lineage—your grandfather's line, not mine." I accepted her response but felt puzzled. Later, I learned that she had lost her mother at a very young age and was raised by a paternal aunt. Perhaps her reluctance stemmed from pain she preferred not to revisit, couched in the patriarchal norms of her upbringing. Even as she recounted the lineage of the family she married into, her own story seemed absent—a reflection of the cultural practices that shape how history is passed down. For diasporans like me, genealogy is more than a pastime—it's a cultural anchor. It connects us to our roots, providing a sense of belonging in a world that often feels fragmented. Living in the United States, where histories are meticulously documented, has heightened my awareness of the gaps in Uganda's records. Much of our history is preserved orally, passed through generations, but as elders pass away, these stories risk being lost forever.

Genealogy also has legal implications. Under Uganda's Citizenship and Immigration Control Act, citizenship by birth is granted to:

- (a) Every person born in Uganda, one of whose parents or grandparents belonged to any indigenous community residing within Uganda's borders as of February 1, 1926.
- (b) Every person born in or outside Uganda, one of whose parents or grandparents was a Ugandan citizen by birth. Proving descent, however, often requires documentation, which can be challenging in societies where oral traditions dominate.

Proving descent, however, often requires documentation, which can be challenging in societies where oral traditions dominate. In 2014, during a visit to Dallas, President Museveni explained Uganda's dual citizenship framework by comparing it to the clan system. He argued that a child born abroad still belongs to their father's clan, regardless of birthplace. Citizenship, he said, is simply a modern extension of this understanding—now including maternal lineage to reflect gender equity.

I have always admired President Museveni's ability to simplify complex matters, drawing on cultural frameworks to connect with both peasants and philosophers.

If resources were no barrier, I would fund a comprehensive genealogy project for the Great Lakes Region of Africa. Such an initiative could collect oral histories, digitize clan records, and create a centralized archive accessible worldwide.

Platforms like Geni.com allow users to build family trees, and I've often wondered what it would reveal if all Ugandans participated. Imagine discovering how interconnected we truly are, bound by shared ancestors and histories. The Great Lakes Museum and the Igongo Cultural Center have made strides in preserving regional history. But a national effort—leveraging anthropologists, historians, and technology—could deepen these efforts, uniting Ugandans at home and abroad.

Such a project would not only celebrate our heritage but also illuminate migration patterns, and cultural richness, leaving a profound legacy for future generations. My fascination with genealogy led me to modern tools like DNA testing. When 23 and Me revealed that I shared an ancient paternal lineage with Pharaoh Ramesses III, I was astonished. These discoveries remind me that genealogy connects us not only to our families but to a global human story.

The academic field of genealogy is expanding, with institutions like the University of Strathclyde in the United Kingdom offering advanced degrees in genealogical studies. Its applications span law, medicine and forensic science, demonstrating genealogy's growing importance. Could Uganda's diaspora unite to support a national genealogy project? I believe so. Many of us long to reconnect with our roots and preserve our cultural heritage. By pooling resources, we could ensure that our ancestors' stories are cherished for generations.

Genealogy isn't just about the past—it's about shaping the future. For young Ugandans, especially those born abroad, access to a rich repository of genealogical information could inspire a deeper connection to their identity.

As the African proverb goes, "Until the lion learns to write, every story will glorify the hunter." It's time to take charge of our narrative, documenting and honoring the richness of our heritage.

Through genealogy, we affirm our place in history and leave a legacy worth celebrating—one that unites all Ugandans in the shared pride of who we are.














### Fort Patiko: Uncovering The Hidden History of Uganda's Legendary Slave Trade Stronghold

When you inquire about a typical safari in Destination Uganda, the default option tends to be a largely nature-based trip to any of the 10 national parks, 12 wildlife reserves, 5 community wildlife management areas and 13 wildlife sanctuaries. Here, you are assured of a visual feast on the Big Five + 2"—lion, leopard, rhino, elephant, buffalo, chimpanzee, and mountain gorilla—as well as over 345 mammal species, 140+ reptile species, and 1,060 bird species, some of them unique to Uganda. You will be greeted by unforgettable experiences augmented by the tropical climate, unspoiled and unexplored tropical vegetation, hospitable people, and green plateaus across the country.

But this is just part of what Uganda has to offer. There is so much more beyond nature-based tourism, especially if you are willing to venture off the beaten path for some authentic cultural, historical, and heritage experiences.

This is why, when you are on your next immersion into Northern Uganda, I invite you to add a visit to Baker's Fort (Fort Patiko) to your itinerary. For starters, Northern Uganda offers numerous experiences— a diverse mix of natural beauty, rich cultural heritage, and historical significance, but that is a story for another day.

Once a military structure and collection point during the era of the slave trade, this site bears the scars of an era marked by cruelty and endurance. Fort Patiko is enclosed by a 16-foot-wide and 15-foot-deep trench, which was dug purposely to prevent the slaves from escaping. The fort is neighbored by six hills; Ajulu, Ladwong, Akara, Abaka, and Labworomor in the north, and Kiju Hill in the south. The fort covers approximately 9.4 hectares. The fort owes its establishment to the exploration of the Nile, which attracted explorers, missionaries, and colonial powers with diverse agendas. Among them was Sir Samuel Baker, a renowned British explorer and abolitionist. In the early 1860s, Baker passed through this land, witnessing firsthand the inhumanity of the slave trade. Slaves were taken from here to be screened in Gondokoro (modern-day South Sudan) and transported to the Middle East, a grim trade that Baker vowed to end. In 1873, Baker overcame the brutal slave traders who had terrorized the region.

Today, the dark markings on the fort's ancient rocks are thought to be the blood of countless victims. The fort's historical features include storage spaces for millet, simsim, and an armoury used during turbulent times. Baker, supported by Egyptians, led efforts to dismantle the slave trade and served as Governor-General of the Equatorial Nile Basin (which now straddles South Sudan and Northern Uganda) from 1869 to 1873. After Baker, the Fort was used by Emin Pasha and Charles Gordon while they served as Governor of Equatorial Province. Currently, the fort is in a state of ruins and open to the public for research and educational purposes.

Despite the fort's dark history, it also offers visitors a chance to connect with the resilience of humanity. A visit to Fort Patiko now goes beyond history it's an experience. One can engage in activities like nature walks, hiking and arrow shooting. Join community visits to interact with locals and partake in their daily lives, fostering a deeper understanding of their culture.

Kampala- Kitara and Uganda Cranes forward Denis Omedi was nominated for the prestigious 2024 FIFA Puskás Award, following his breathtaking reverse strike goal against KCCA in the FUFA Super 8 quarter-finals on August 6, 2024, at MTN Omondi Stadium, Lugogo. Positioned at the edge of the penalty box, Omedi delivered a moment of sheer brilliance, executing a perfect rabona that flew past goalkeeper Anthony Emojong into the top corner, leveling the match at 1-1. Garnacho was recognized for his spectacular goal, alongside other finalists Kudus, Antonis, Al Haydos, Benzia, Bou, Dimarco, Chirinos, Onuachu, and Philogene.

Named after the legendary Hungarian striker Ferenc Puskás, the award honors the most spectacular goals scored during the qualifying period. Voting for the Puskás Award was open to fans worldwide via FIFA's official website, culminating in the announcement during the FIFA Best Awards ceremony in January 2025.

Denis's top-three finish not only highlights his individual brilliance but also shines a spotlight on Ugandan football, showcasing the talent emerging from local leagues and elevating the nation's presence on the global stage.
