

#### AU Unveils Bold Agricultural Strategies at CAADP Summit in Kampala



Kampala - Ministers of Agriculture from the African Union's (AU) 55 member states recently concluded a three-day Extraordinary Summit in Kampala, Uganda, marking a pivotal moment for the continent's agricultural future. The summit culminated is set to culminate in the adoption of the Kampala Declaration and the unveiling of a landmark ten-year Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP) Strategy and Action Plan, designed to accelerate agricultural growth, enhance food security, and improve livelihoods across Africa. The strategy, which spans from 2026 to 2035, was developed over ten months under the directives of African Heads of State and Government.

It builds on the Malabo Declaration on Accelerated Agricultural Growth and Transformation for Shared Prosperity and Improved Livelihoods, adopted in 2014, and aligns with the 2021 African Common Position to the United Nations Food Systems Summit. By focusing on sustainability and inclusivity, the CAADP Strategy seeks to address the continent's persistent challenges in achieving food security and agricultural transformation. Speaking at the summit's opening, Uganda's Prime Minister, Rt. Hon. Robinah Nabbanja, highlighted Africa's vast agricultural potential. She pointed to the continent's rich soils, abundant grable land, and the fact that 60 percent of its population is engaged in agriculture.

However, she also underscored the challenges Africa faces, particularly its staggering food import bill, which stands at USD 100 billion annually. "For us to guarantee our future as Africans, we must feed ourselves," she declared, calling for concrete solutions to reverse the continent's dependence on imported food. Africa's food security crisis remains a pressing concern, with over 280 million people suffering from chronic hunger. Rapid population growth, climate change, conflicts, and economic disruptions have exacerbated these challenges.



The CAADP Strategy aims to address these issues by promoting climate-resilient agriculture, improving infrastructure, reducing food waste, and fostering regional trade in agricultural goods. It also envisions increasing agrifood output by 45 percent by 2035, tripling intra-African trade in agricultural products, reducing post-harvest losses, and boosting the share of locally processed food in the agrifood GDP.Ugandan President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni delivered a comprehensive address outlining his vision for agricultural transformation. He emphasized the need for Africa to shift from raw material production to value addition, retaining economic benefits within the continent. "We must create finished products locally to retain value and generate employment opportunities," he stated. He also stressed the importance of open borders for trade and collaboration among African nations, urging leaders to address non-tariff barriers that hinder agricultural progress.

The summit showcased success stories, including Ethiopia's integration of CAADP into its National Agricultural Investment Plan (NAIP). Ethiopian Minister of Agriculture, H.E. Dr. Girma Amente, highlighted his country's achievement in meeting CAADP's 6 percent annual growth target by significantly increasing agricultural outputs.

Ethiopia's emphasis on public investment in agriculture has improved crop yields, livestock production, and overall food security, setting an example for other nations. The strategy's inclusivity was a central theme throughout the summit.

H.E. Ambassador Josefa Sacko, AU Commissioner for Agriculture, Rural Development, Blue Economy, and Sustainable Environment, emphasized the importance of empowering women, youth, and marginalized groups. She noted that the CAADP Strategy aims to expand value addition, create millions of jobs, and build resilient agrifood systems capable of withstanding shocks and stressors.

It builds on the Malabo Declaration on Accelerated Agricultural Growth and Transformation for Shared Prosperity and Improved Livelihoods, adopted in 2014, and aligns with the 2021 African Common Position to the United Nations Food Systems Summit. By focusing on sustainability and inclusivity, the CAADP Strategy seeks to address the continent's persistent challenges in achieving food security and agricultural transformation. Speaking at the summit's opening, Uganda's Prime Minister, Rt. Hon. Robinah Nabbanja, highlighted Africa's vast agricultural potential. She pointed to the continent's rich soils, abundant arable land, and the fact that 60 percent of its population is engaged in agriculture. The summit concluded with a strong call to action from Hon. Frank Tumwebaze, Uganda's Minister of Agriculture, Animal Industry, and Fisheries, who chaired the drafting of the CAADP Strategy. He stressed the urgency of moving from planning to execution. "The planning phase ends during this summit. We must now focus on execution to make a meaningful impact on our continent and our people," he said. Tumwebaze called for advances in agricultural research, the establishment of resilient farming systems, and the promotion of agro-industrialization.

## Uganda and UNESCO Sign Agreement on Upgrade to Antenna Office

Kampala: Minister of Foreign Affairs Hon. Odongo Jeje Abubakhar, alongside the Director of UNESCO Multisectoral Regional Office for Eastern Africa, Ms. Haxthausen Louise, signed a Host Country Agreement this morning, upgrading the UNESCO Office in Uganda from a Project Office to an Antennae Office. The Project Office in Kampala collaborates with the Government of Uganda, Civil Society, Private Sector, and development partners within the UN Delivering as One framework to enhance policies and programs in peace-building, poverty eradication, sustainable development, and intercultural dialogue through education, sciences, culture, communication, and information.





Ms. Haxthausen highlighted that the Antenna Office status will enable enhanced collaboration avenues, granting direct access to UNESCO's network of experts and resources. This will facilitate addressing resource challenges more effectively and implementing impactful projects aligned with UNESCO's priorities. Hon. Odongo described the signing as a "pivotal" moment in Uganda's partnership with UNESCO, ensuring seamless operations and synchronized collaboration with partners for advancing shared objectives in various fields of UNESCO's competence in Uganda.

## Uganda and Pakistan Foster Diplomatic Ties through Political Consultations in Kampala



Kampala: The Government of Uganda and the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, through their respective Ministries of Foreign Affairs, successfully held the inaugural session of Political Consultations in Kampala on Friday, January 17, 2025. Ahead of the technical-level talks, the Pakistani delegation paid courtesy calls on the Minister of State for Foreign Affairs in charge of International Affairs, Hon. Oryem Henry Okello, on January 16, and the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Hon. Odongo Jeje Abubakhar, on January 17, 2025.

Both Ministers welcomed the initiative, emphasizing that formalizing this framework would pave the way for a stronger bilateral relationship. They noted that Uganda and Pakistan could collaborate extensively in agroprocessing, mineral development, and ICT investment. The Ugandan delegation to the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was led by Ambassador Charles Ssentongo, Chief of Protocol and Acting Permanent Secretary, while the Pakistani delegation was headed by H.E. Mr. Hamid Asghar Khan, Additional Foreign Secretary.



Held in a cordial and constructive atmosphere, the consultations covered a wide range of bilateral, regional, and global issues of mutual interest. Both sides reaffirmed their commitment to promoting peace and security while deepening their partnership. Discussions focused on enhancing bilateral cooperation, advancing regional diplomatic relations, and addressing common concerns on international and multilateral platforms.

Amb. Ssentongo highlighted that the talks laid the groundwork for greater collaboration between the two Ministries and their respective Governments fostering people-to-people while stronger interactions. ## Uganda Hands Over Chairmanship of G77 +China At UN Headquarters

New York - On January 13th, 2024, His Excellency Ambassador Adonia Ayebare completed his tenure as the Chairman of the Group of 77 and China, a coalition of developing nations dedicated to addressing global economic challenges and advocating for a fairer international system for the Global South.

The handover ceremony took place at the ECOSOC chamber in the United Nations Headquarters in New York, featuring distinguished guests including United Nations Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, President of the General Assembly Ambassador Philemon Yang, and Iraq's Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Foreign Affairs Dr. Fuad Hussein.

During his chairmanship, Uganda's Permanent Representative to the UN outlined significant achievements made by the Group of 77 and China under his leadership. These accomplishments included securing agreements on financing for sustainable development, supporting Small Island Developing States, and advancing the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

## The Importance of the Open-door Policy for Refugees as Uganda's Foreign Policy



Uganda's history of hosting refugees traces back to 1940s, in the wake of World War II when thousands of Polish refugees fled Europe for safety in Africa. By 1954, Uganda had become the safest destination for many Africans from the East African region including Kenyans fleeing the Mau Mau uprising. Entering mid-1950s, close to 80,000 Sudanese refugees had fled the first civil war and sought refuge in Uganda.

As time went by, the unwavering civil unrests and political instability within the Greatlakes region saw Uganda's policy makers establishing utmost commitment to consider the refugee crisis as a foreign policy concern. With the enactment of the 2006 Refugee Act and its 2010 Regulations, over 1.7 million refugees are currently hosted by over 13 settlements in Uganda, with the Nakivale refugee settlement in Southwestern Uganda being the oldest refugee camp in Africa after its formation in 1959. With such a history, it is almost inevitable for refugees from the region and the entire Africa not to choose Uganda as their preferred destination thus justifying the goodwill of the Ugandan government to open her doors

To maintain consistency with the Refugee Convention and Protocol, Uganda's legal framework avails refugees' access to key rights and social services on equal terms with nationals, including freedom of movement, access to national health and education services.

These present crucial differences with the policies of most neighboring countries where refugees are typically confined in camps, face very long registration process, are often refused the status of refugees and cannot work and provide for their livelihood, remaining dependent on humanitarian-based care and assistance. These components of the Refugee Act make it the most progressive refugee law in Africa and has enabled the Uganda settlement approach, a progressive protection model where refugees are welcomed, registered, allocated land and provided with legal documents.

The Uganda model is widely celebrated as a liberal policy that has played a crucial role in fostering peaceful coexistence in the African continent where Uganda ranks as the largest refugee host country, and fifth on the global stage. With such a policy, children and women are less prone to vulnerabilities because the policy is embedded on the Self-Reliance Strategy; meaning the refugees are empowered with both financial support and a plot of land to be self-supportive without entirely depending on humanitarian assistances. This places the responsibility in the hands of the head of the family to work and provide for his family. This is important to the African man whose confidence is built on his ability to protect and provide for his family thus reducing any possibilities of domestic violence that may arise out of frustration.



The policy stands out as a true reflection of the African belief that a problem shared is a problem half-solved. This concept entirely aligns with the Pan-African ideology that is embedded in the spirit of "Ubuntu", to represent the true oneness of the African people in addressing a common concern.

In the long run, this creates room for people-to-people interactions and may greatly improve Uganda's international image as an admirable global center of solidarity. Refugees in Uganda are able to move freely; access social services, can operate businesses and may as well find employment opportunities while bringing valuable skills and technical-knowhow to the informal sector. They also play a critical role as consumers of local Ugandan products since refugees in rural settlements buy goods from Ugandan producers. With this, refugees increase possibilities of α functional communication strategy between their host country and their country of origin which is a good ingredient for a progressive bilateralism.

However, refugee hosting also presents some downsides ranging from security threats, social conflicts over the scarce available resources and shortage of funds to facilitate an implementation of the Uganda model. Given that the country has been struggling with its fight against poverty and providing basic amenities to its citizens, donor funding matters very much because the benefits are for both refugees and the local communities. A case in point is the project run by UNHCR to build local infrastructure, that serves the entire community living in a given area. The World Bank too is making efforts to improve local-level development opportunities. These projects are meant to ease pressure on the country and the people hosting refugees.

Donors generally appreciate Uganda's welcoming attitude to refugees and are making commitments to fund, for instance the European Union made €200 million available while Japan has been crucial in providing aids just as Saudi Arabia, by providing relief support.

These among others give precedence for more donors to come on board and support the effective Uganda approach to combating refugee crisis.

The Uganda model is doing the international community a noble service for mankind. People who flee from strife-torn areas to foreign countries need a safe home where they can live in dignity and hope of a better life even while away from their places of origin. Inclusive policies are thus necessary, and they must pay attention to the special needs of the traumatized people who have experienced brutal violence. These suddenly make the open-door policy for refugees a prerequisite to Uganda's foreign relations.

Through projects like Jazz with Isaiah and collaborations with international artists, to bring the world to Uganda and vice versa. With his music being featured in prestigious settings such as South African and Kenyan Airways and gaining airplay in international markets, for Katumwa, this is just the beginning. "I've always felt like I'm at the start of my journey, here's so much more to achieve," he affirms. Katumwa's story is a testament to the power of perseverance, vision, and cultural pride. He calls on Ugandan artists to think beyond local success and strive for global impact.

## Uganda's Creative Economy Meets Global Trade in a Bold Discussion

The Bold Woman Fund, East Africa Arts, and Bold in Africa, in partnership with the British Council under the Creative DNA Programme, hosted an E-Commerce Panel Discussion on Navigating the Barriers to E-Commerce Trade in Uganda" on January 28, 2025, at Four Points by Sheraton Hotel. Rasheeda Programme Nalumoso, Regional Manager at the British Council, highlighted the importance supporting the growth of creative businesses." She emphasized ecommerce's role in public diplomacy and business, noting, "Thinking of ecommerce in the broadest sense, from public diplomacy to business, this discussion excites me."



The discussions, moderated by Bold in Africa's co-founder and managing director, Nunu Mugenyi, featured two panels. Panel One included Juliana Nasasira, founder of Kwesh; Steven Kateihwaho, Commercial Manager at DHL Uganda; and Rachel Bashabe, founder of Veryl Designs.

Ms. Nasasira shared how she successfully launched her store during the May 2021 COVID-19 lockdown after pausing an earlier website. She overcame payment challenges using WIX's direct payment system but faced raw material shortages and difficulty finding skilled tailors.

Mr. Kateihwaho cited logistics as Uganda's biggest e-commerce challenge. "To address high shipping costs, we have designed green boxes tailored to fashion logistics," he said, urging entrepreneurs to implement return policies and leverage creative hubs like MoTIV.



Ms. Bashabe switched from Posta Uganda to DHL for faster shipping and advised businesses to conduct dummy runs while focusing on branding and storytelling.

Panel Two featured Margaret Kafeero, Head of Public Diplomacy at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Uganda; Agaba Collins, Sector Coordinator for Trade, Transport, and Logistics at the Private Sector Foundation Uganda (PSFU); and Rachel Bashabe.

Ms. Bashabe called for greater government support for small businesses. "We need to hold policymakers and the British Council accountable, beyond just providing funding," she asserted.

Mr. Collins pointed out PSFU's struggles with high fabric costs due to Uganda Revenue Authority (URA) charges, emphasizing the need for financial literacy.



Ms. Kafeero noted that diplomats are among Uganda's top fashion consumers, as the Ministry promotes Ugandan interests through economic diplomacy. She highlighted initiatives like cultural exhibitions and people-to-people diplomacy.

During COVID-19, Uganda's Mission in Washington, D.C., secured spaces to sell Ugandan products. "We wanted to tell a story, so we focused on bark cloth and Ankole horn, partnering with the African Textile Museum to commission pieces and ship them via DHL," she said.

The exhibition attracted 25,000 visitors, a major milestone.Ms. Kafeero stressed quality control, while Ms. Mugenyi reiterated PSFU's role in economic diplomacy through B2B connections and culture weeks abroad.



The event concluded with a networking cocktail for creatives and stakeholders.

# Brit-Ugandan Completes a 13,000 Km from Cape Town to London

London - A British-Ugandan man has accomplished an extraordinary feat by becoming the first person to run from Cape Town in South Africa to London, completing a challenging 13,000km (8,200 mile) journey. Deo Kato embarked on this remarkable journey to raise awareness about racism and successfully reached the finish line in Downing Street after running through 15 countries over a period of 518 days. Along the way, he faced various obstacles including illnesses, visa challenges, and even a stint in prison, highlighting the arduous nature of his epic adventure. Despite his run advocating for pro-migration sentiments, Deo Kato revealed that he encountered racial abuse in parts of Europe, shedding light on the negative perceptions surrounding migration.

He expressed concerns over the current portrayals of migrants and emphasized the historical benefits that migrants have brought to society. Motivated by his experiences of racism, Deo Kato initiated the 'Running for Justice' movement, emphasizing the emotional and physical challenges he encountered during his run. Despite moments of doubt and physical exhaustion, he found strength in the support of those who rallied behind him, encouraging him to persevere.

Setting off from Cape Town in July 2023, Deo Kato navigated through war zones in his journey north, facing conflicts in regions such as the eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo, Sudan, and northern Ethiopia. His passage through southern Europe presented additional difficulties, with instances of being filmed and reported to the police.Reflecting on his challenging experiences, Deo Kato shared updates on his running journey through dramatic images on his Instagram page, showcasing his resilience in scaling mountains and camping in remote terrain. Upon reaching London, he was greeted by a warm reception from friends, family, well-wishers, and his partner, Alice Light, at the finish line.

Deo Kato expressed his belief that his efforts, alongside others dedicated to combating racial discrimination, are laying the groundwork for future generations to continue striving towards a world free from racial prejudice.

Nairobi - Presidents William Ruto and Yoweri Museveni officially inaugurated the Jaramogi Oginga Odinga Stadium in Siaya County, western Kenya. The Jaramogi Oginga Odinga Stadium, a FIFA-standard facility with a seating capacity of 20,000, is set to transform the sports scene in western Kenya. Designed to host top-tier competitions, the stadium features an eight-lane athletics track, VIP lounges, floodlights, and a secure perimeter.

President Ruto stated that they are extending their efforts beyond national borders to promote multinational sports competitions, aiming to foster cross-border harmony, encourage talent exchange, and enhance regional integration. In his address following the football match at the stadium, President Museveni urged the youth to enjoy playing football while also remembering that the key to escaping poverty lies in engaging with the four sectors of wealth creation: commercial agriculture, industry, services, and ICT. He later congratulated Gor Mahia FC for their victory and Kitara FC for their spirited performance, which pushed the game to a penalty shootout that ended 9-8 in favor of Gor Mahia.

The First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of East African Community Affairs, Rt. Hon. Rebecca Kadaga, and former Kenyan Prime Minister Raila Odinga also attended the event.


